Presidential Jobs Summit Two – Day Colloquium

CONTEXT

As part of the Presidential Job Summit process the NEDLAC constituencies have agreed to hold a colloquium where experts, researchers and practitioners will be invited to present proposals for projects, programmes, policies or ways of transforming the economy to accelerate job creation.

The colloquium aims to provide an opportunity to explore a wide range of options that could have a large-scale impact on job creation and economic inclusion. While the colloquium would not aim to reach agreement on proposals, it would provide substantive proposals that the social partners would be able to explore in preparation for the Job Summit

The colloquium is structured around the five themes that Nedlac has agreed for the Job Summit, with two to three themes running in parallel as shown in the attached draft programme. The presentations will be clustered within each theme in ways that promote a focused discussion.

The themes are:

- Economic Sector-Specific Interventions
- Small and Micro-Enterprise Support
- Education and Skills
- Inclusive Growth, Redistribution and Transformation
- Public and Social Programmes, Labour Market and Anti-Corruption Interventions
