FEDUSA Leaders Join United Labour Front at L20 Summit



FEDUSA leaders joined delegates from COSATU, SAFTU and NACTU at the 2025 Labour 20 (L20) Summit in George where South Africa's trade union movement stood united with global counterparts to demand a just, inclusive and worker-led global recovery.

The Summit takes place on the sidelines of the G20 Employment Working Group meeting and the Employment and Labour Ministers' Meeting that was held in George, Western Cape.

Held against the backdrop of rising inequality, climate collapse, and economic volatility, the summit saw labour federations confront a global system rigged against working people.

Benjamin played an active role in shaping resolutions on decent work, the crisis of informality, trade justice, climate finance, and digital labour regulation.

In robust discussions, delegates condemned austerity, corporate impunity, and extractive development models, insisting that workers must not carry the costs of elite failure.

FEDUSA joined the call for urgent action to formalise informal work, extend social protection, and ensure decent work under the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA).

The summit also advanced a strong resolution to protect platform workers, demanding full recognition, union rights, algorithmic transparency, and public oversight over digital labour platforms.







The L20 issued a bold call for gender equality, youth employment, and progressive taxation, supporting a global wealth tax and rejecting debt-driven policy conditionalities that erode state capacity.

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Delegates were unanimous in condemning the genocidal war on Gaza, demanding global accountability and the restoration of international law. FEDUSA's presence at the L20 reaffirmed its commitment to global solidarity, democratic unionism, and economic transformation.

As the labour movement warned in George: the polite era of waiting is over. Workers are organising, mobilising, and rising to reclaim power, in workplaces, in bargaining councils, and in global policy forums.

The future, they insisted, must belong to the many, not the few.



FEDUSA and HAK-İŞ Strengthen Global Trade Union Ties



In a continued effort to strengthen global labour solidarity, FEDUSA and Turkey's Confederation of Right Trade Unions (HAK-iŞ) convened a joint training programme focused on enhancing trade union collaboration and capacity building.

The session addressed evolving trade union strategies, labour law developments in Turkey, gender equality within unions, and digitalisation. The collaboration seeks to deepen mutual support in times of crisis, strengthen joint campaigns, and foster shared research and communications platforms.

A reciprocal training hosted by FEDUSA is on the horizon, further solidifying ties in pursuit of a more coordinated global trade union movement.

FEDUSA Demands Action for Worker Safety in **Iron and Steel Sector**

Speaking at the 2025 National Occupational Health and Safety Conference in Klerksdorp, FEDUSA Social Justice Officer Brenda Modise delivered a hard-hitting call for urgent reforms to protect workers in the hazardous iron and steel sector.

Modise described the daily dangers workers face, including toxic fumes, high heat exposure, and unsafe machinery, as unacceptable.

She condemned employers who prioritise profit over safety and called for more rigorous enforcement of existing safety laws. "No worker should be forced to choose between earning a living and staying alive," she said.

FEDUSA reaffirmed that workplace safety must be recognised as a basic human right.

FEDUSA welcomed the newly appointed General Secretary of the Professional Educators Union (PEU), Jabu Madonsela, at a leadership engagement hosted at FEDUSA House in Roodepoort. The meeting marked a formal introduction following the retirement of former PEU General Secretary Ben Machipi.

The discussion reaffirmed the close partnership between FEDUSA and PEU, grounded in a shared commitment to social justice and sector advocacy. The visit underscored education both organisations' pledge to continue advancing the rights and wellbeing of education workers across South Africa.











FEDUSA HOSTS WEBINAR ON NATIONAL HEALTH INSURANCE GOVERNANCE REGULATIONS

As South Africa enters the next phase of National Health Insurance implementation, FEDUSA hosted a timely webinar on the governance regulations issued under the NHI Act.

The draft regulations, which were open for public comment until in June, 2025 propose frameworks for oversight and accountability in the NHI Fund.



Keynote speaker Dr Aaron Motsoaledi, Minister of Health, noted the fiscal pressures on the health system and acknowledged the debate between single-payer and multi-payer models.

He stressed the need to curb corruption and ensure affordability in rolling out the NHI.

FEDUSA's engagement with diverse stakeholders in this forum reaffirmed its role as a critical voice for frontline workers and the public interest in shaping South Africa's healthcare future.

FEDUSA PECs Participate in SOPAs

FEDUSA's Provincial Executive Committees (PECs) actively engage in State of the Province Addresses (SOPAs), demonstrating the federation's commitment to provincial governance.

These vital platforms allow PECs to directly advocate for workers' rights and interests as provincial premiers outline their policy agendas. By ensuring workers' voices are heard in these crucial forums, FEDUSA strengthens social dialogue and pushes for policies that drive economic growth and social justice.

















FINANCIAL EMPOWERMENT TRAINING



FEDUSA continues to invest in worker empowerment through targeted training initiatives designed to build union leadership and promote financial resilience across the country. In the first half of 2025, the federation's Training Department delivered impactful programmes that strengthened members' capacity to lead, represent, and protect fellow workers.

Shop Steward Training: Building Confidence, Strengthening Representation

In April and June 2025, two Basic Shop Steward Training sessions were successfully held in Kimberley and Durban. A combined total of 66 participants, newly elected shop stewards, took part in the two-day sessions, which were led by FEDUSA's Training Officer, Boni Mbewana.

The programme was designed to develop core skills that enable shop stewards to confidently identify, report, and resolve workplace issues. Participants were introduced to the full scope of their representational duties, including grievance procedures, case management, and advocacy for fair workplace practices.

The training placed strong emphasis on transforming stewards into bold, informed, and principled defenders of workers' rights, frontline leaders in the pursuit of fairness and accountability.

Financial Empowerment: New Phase Launched, Hundreds Reached FEDUSA has also concluded Phase 3 of its Financial Empowerment Programme, which ran from June 2024 to June 2025 and trained 434 members from various union affiliates across the country.

The curriculum covered:

- The Two-Pot Retirement System, designed to give workers earlier access to a portion of their pension savings while preserving long-term retirement security.
- Section 37C Death Benefits, providing clarity on benefit distribution processes and legal rights.
- Personal Finance Management, including debt management, budgeting techniques, and savings strategies.

These sessions reflect FEDUSA's broader commitment to improving the economic literacy of its members, enabling them to make informed decisions and secure their financial well-being. Financial empowerment is central to FEDUSA's vision for resilient, independent workers who are equipped to thrive in a challenging economy.

Through these programmes, FEDUSA continues to empower its members, building a confident, informed, and united trade union movement ready to meet the demands of today's workplace and tomorrow's challenges.

This year's theme, "Employability, Living Wage, Peace and Economic Transformation for Social Justice in Africa," highlights ITUC-Africa's focus was on addressing key labour market challenges and ensuring sustainable development across the continent.

Since 2011, the New Year School has been a platform for trade union leaders to build skills, exchange ideas, and tackle socio-economic issues. The programme, led by the African Labour Research and Education Institute (ALREI), focused on:

- Enhancing Employability Addressing youth unemployment and skills gaps.
- Advocating for a Living Wage Promoting fair wages for workers.
- Driving Economic Transformation Supporting inclusive, sustainable development.
- Strengthening Peace and Social Justice Empowering trade unions in advocacy efforts.

Ditsela's four-day Arbitration Course at FEDUSA House equipped union representatives with essential LRA dispute resolution skills, particularly for the CCMA process. Participants gained practical insights into case preparation and arbitration procedures. The aimed to enhance understanding of arbitration, trainina preparation, and representation skills.

Lee-Ann Lowe (SAOU) and Ndumiso Gagayi (UNTU) praised the course, citing its effectiveness in improving their ability to represent members. Lowe stated, "We have learned a lot of important principles and things to look out for as shop steward when preparing for arbitration and the process for that."

emphasized increased confidence Gagayi strateaic and understanding, saying, "Ever since I attended the training, I feel that I short-changed the members, but now I can represent them fairly and have confidence that I can win their cases."

The course targeted union representatives with LRA knowledge, aiming to refine their advocacy skills for fair worker representation.

South Africa: Why C190 is Crucial for Protecting Workers from Violence and Harassment



CRISIS DUE TO WORKPLACE VIOLENCE

Convention on Elimination of Violence and Harassment in the World of Work Supplemented by a Recommendation (C190 & Recommendation 206).

Convention No. 190 (C190), adopted by the International Labour Organization (ILO) in 2019, addresses the issue of violence and harassment in the world of work. It is particularly important for South Africa for several reasons:

- 1. Safe Workplaces: Creates a framework for safe and respectful work environments for all.
- 2. Combatting Gender-Based Violence: Focuses on preventing and responding to sexual harassment.
- 3. International Standards: Aligns South Africa with global norms for worker protection.
- 4. Stronger Legal Framework: Provides clearer guidelines for what constitutes workplace violence and harassment.
- 5. Improved Productivity: Fosters a stable workforce and reduces absenteeism.
- 6. Employee Empowerment: Encourages training and awareness to prevent violence and harassment.
- 7. Social Justice Alignment: Supports South Africa's goals of equity, gender equality, and social justice.
- 8. Legal Remedy for Victims: Provides clearer avenues for victims to seek justice.

Convention 190 supplemented by R206 is important for South Africa because it offers a clear, international framework for protecting workers from all forms of violence and harassment. It supports the country's efforts to create safer, more inclusive workplaces while addressing pressing social issues such as gender-based violence. By adopting and implementing this convention, South Africa would be taking a significant step toward improving workers' rights, enhancing economic productivity, and advancing social justice.

FEDUSA Participation at the 69th Commission on the Status of Women

FEDUSA participated in the sixty-ninth session of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) held at the United Nations Headquarters in New York.

This session marked the 30th anniversary of the 4th World Conference on Women and the adoption of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action in 1995. FEDUSA acknowledges the significance of this anniversary and contributed to the international discussion on advancing gender equality

The primary focus of the 69th session was the critical review and evaluation of the implementation of the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action, as well as the outcomes of the 23rd special session of the General Assembly. FEDUSA actively participated in the assessment of current obstacles to the progress of the Platform for Action and its contribution to achieving the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

FEDUSA's presence highlighted its commitment to ensuring that the perspectives of working women are represented on the international stage. Through engagement in these important discussions, FEDUSA aimed to contribute to the development of global standards and policies that promote gender equality and empower women in all aspects of life.



Following briefings to Parliament on 2025 readiness, General Secretary Grant Abbott warned, "It's clear our past concerns are more serious than we thought."


NATU ATTENDS 2025 BASIC EDUCATION LEKGOTLA





ITUC AFRICA TO CELEBRATE INTERNATIONAL WORKERS' DAY



On May 1st each year, workers across the world unite in solidarity to celebrate International Workers' Day—an occasion that honours the historic struggles and achievements of the labour movement. Rooted in the fight for an eight-hour workday, this commemoration remains a powerful reminder of the ongoing struggle for fair wages, safe working conditions, and social justice.

In 2025, ITUC-Africa will mark this day under the theme "Industrialization, Trade, and Decent Work for Social Justice." This theme highlights the urgent need to harness industrialisation and trade as transformative forces to generate decent employment, foster sustainable economic growth, and promote equity and dignity for African workers.

Unions urge strong action to protect steel industry jobs amid economic uncertainty and trade tensions

Rising economic uncertainty and geopolitical tensions are exacerbating long-standing challenges in the steel industry. IndustriALL Global Union, IndustriAll Europe, and TUAC call on governments at the 97th OECD Steel Committee to ensure that workers do not bear the brunt of these pressures through declining real wages, worsening working conditions, and job losses.



As in the past, OECD data confirms that global steelmaking capacity continues to grow despite weak demand and a sluggish economic outlook. By the end of 2024, global steelmaking capacity had reached 2,472 million metric tonnes and is expected to rise further in the coming years. Nearly half of this capacity is in China, where declining domestic demand since 2020 has driven production towards export markets, increasing pressure on other economies.
